Cervical Cancer Awareness Among the Bangladeshi Community

On the 7th August, 2016, SABCA and SA Cervix Screening Program, Women's and Children's Health Network, SA Health jointly organised this seminar for Bangladeshi females, with the aim to increase awareness among the participants about the prevention of Cervical Cancer and the importance of regular Cervix screening. The presentation was specially developed for Bangladeshi community and presented by Bengali speaking speaker Dr. Khadiza Tul Kubra (GP), along with Jacqueline Riviere, Project Officer, SA Cervix Screening. Around 50 females actively participated the seminar which was highly appreciated by the community members and by the SA Health.






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

ow-a-days we hear about changes in our health services in South Australia. What are these all about?

Australian Healthcare System

The healthcare in Australia is complex. Broadly speaking, Australian healthcare is funded public and privately.

Private Sector

The common private health sector providers are medical practitioners (GP, specialist), pharmacist, dentist, private hospitals etc. The private health system accesses funds from Federal Government (e.g. Medicare), insurance companies (such as Bupa, HBF, HCF, Medibank Private and so on) and direct out of pocket money from patients or clients.

Private insurance companies receive substantial amount of subsidy from Federal Government. Majority Australians who have private health cover receive 30% subsidy from Federal Government.

Public System

The public health system is supported by all 3 level of Government (federal, state/territories & local).

Federal Government provide funding to range of primary & age care services, Medicare, Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS), It also provide co-funding to public hospitals with states & territories as well other services.

The states and territories run the public hospitals, community based health care (e.g. migrant health), mental health, drug & alcohol services, and so on.

The local councils run environmental health services (such as sanitation, waste disposal, food safety monitoring), school immunisation program, etc.

What Changes are Expected?

Due to huge cost of running health services and development of new technologies, all level of Governments and private sectors constantly looking at cost reduction and delivering services efficiently. Duplication of services and over servicing are significant problem in healthcare. South Australian hospitals are pioneer in electronic health record management in the whole country. This is an area getting significant attention and investment in the Australian states/territories including private hospitals.

Federal Government is currently trialing various model of care through 31 Primary Health Networks. Expected outcomes are not yet clear.

South Australia is undergoing Transforming Health. The vision of Transforming Health is, "Best care, first time, every time". Transforming Health Values are centred on six quality principles:

1. Patient centred 2. Safe 3. Effective 4. Accessible 5. Efficient, and 6. Equitable.

- Risk to the financial sustainability of healthcare

Transforming Health journey started in June 2014 and progressing step by step. Delivering the Transforming Health process started in March 2015. It focuses on evidence-based, statewide models of care, improve patient access and flow, some of the state's services to work differently in partnership.

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

ore than three million Australians are living with depression and anxiety and even though these conditions are treatable,

the stigma about these conditions can make it difficult to seek support, particularly in multicultural communities.

beyondblue works to raise awareness of mental health conditions and suicide prevention by encouraging people to speak about their experiences, but recognises that discussions about such issues are still taboo in some cultures.

However, beyondblue Research and Evaluation Leader Dr Stephen Carbone said there were many challenging aspects to the migrant experience in Australia that could cause stress and anxiety.

"Settling into a new country can present many new challenges such as learning a new language, understanding new customs and trying to navigate new systems such as public transport, housing, education, work and social security," Dr Carbone said.

"Some people migrate on their own and may, therefore, lack the support of friends and family members to talk to, relax with and get advice and support from.

"Refugees often experience considerable trauma escaping famine or conflict overseas and spending long periods in cramped and unsafe refugee camps.

"While most migrants and refugees handle these stressful events successfully, for some, the stress, trauma and loneliness can lead to mental health conditions such as depression (prolonged sadness) and anxiety (worry and fear)."

Dr Carbone said depression and anxiety were common conditions experienced by people right across the world, even if they didn't openly talk about it.

"Mental health conditions are a global issue, so although we may have different names for particular conditions and different ideas about what causes them, treatments are effective no matter what background a person is from and the sooner we get professional assistance the sooner we will get better and be able to get on with enjoying life," he said.

Dr Carbone encouraged family members to look out for each other and check in with their loved ones if they noticed a change in mood or behaviour.

Depression is characterised by a persistent sadness or unhappiness for days or weeks on end.

People also experience a loss of interest or pleasure in the things they used to enjoy.

Other common symptoms include fatigue, loss of motivation, becoming withdrawn, thinking negatively about everything and having trouble with sleep or appetite.

tralia, around one in five people between the ages of 16-85 will experience a mental health condition in any given year and just under 50 per cent will experience at least one episode of a mental health condition across their life time," Dr Carbone said.

"The important thing to remember is that mental health conditions are not a sign of weakness or failure – they are health conditions like any other.

"There are very effective treatments for mental health conditions and it makes sense to seek professional advice from a doctor so that they can help you to getter better as soon as possible.
